LENTEN THEME 2021– 'God has come near'

Lent is the liturgical season for prayer, reflection and contrition for any wrongdoing we have made in our lives as we prepare for the joyous season of Easter. The theme for Lent 2021 has been taken from the Gospel of Mark. In chapter 1, Jesus came into Galilee after spending 40 days in the wilderness being tempted by Satan, and there He uttered His first words in public ministry:

"The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is near; repent and believe in the gospel."

The world has experienced a great upheaval because of the coronavirus which has shaken our sense of certainty and expectations of the future; all of our lives have been disrupted and changed; our livelihoods may have been adversely affected, our health and those we love may have been compromised; we may have suffered loss and grief, periods of time filled with fear, anxiety and uncertainty; we may have been challenged to find hope and peace in our lives. This theme reaches out of each of us, to remind us that God is always with us, offering us a way back from the wilderness into God's love and care and a way to live, through the teachings of Jesus in the Gospel. Let us embrace God and each other and allow the love and peace of God to fill our hearts.

LENTEN WEEKLY REFLECTION.

Week 5 Beauty in His Glory

Today is the fifth weekend of Lent and we pause to reflect.

The Old and New Testaments and our prayers often refer to the glory of God – for example, Then Moses went up to the mountain, and the cloud covered the mountain. The glory of the Lord rested on Mount Sinai (Exodus 24:15); Then they will see the Son of Man coming in clouds with great power and glory (Mark 13: 26); Glory to God in the highest ... (Gloria); Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit ... We acknowledge that we are made for God and in God's image. We give glory to God by living a life of faith, by drawing close to God, praising and giving thanks and giving witness to the teachings of Jesus. Let us use this period of Lent to reflect on our lives and the place God has within them.

Accommodation sought: A lovely caring Christian woman and her daughter (aged 30) came to Australia from Cairo after the death of the husband/father, in January 2020. This was to be a time of healing for them. They were to stay with family for three months and then return, but COVID meant that they could not return. In order to be allowed to stay the daughter had to study so she could be on a student visa. So the daughter is studying and working 20 hours and the mother is working two half days a week in a \$2 shop. Wanting to have some independence, after relying on family for over 12 months, they are looking for some accommodation, a room, or two rooms, or a bungalow. They cannot afford to pay rent but would willingly contribute to the household by providing cleaning, ironing, cooking and driving people to appointments of shopping. The woman's sister and a friend are trying to assist them financially, including finding a car for them to use whilst here. Would you be interested in such an arrangement? The two women come with high recommendation as wonderful caring women, who would be very competent in whatever they provide for the household, as mentioned. Of course, this would need to be an arrangement where goodwill and generosity prevail from all involved. Fifth Sunday of Lent, Year B

21 March 2021

First Reading Jer 31:31-34

The days are coming when I will make a new covenant with Israel and I will forgive their iniquity.

See, the days are coming - it is the Lord who speaks - when I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel and the House of Judah, but not a covenant like the one I made with their ancestors on the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt. They broke that covenant of mine, so I had to show them who was master. It is the Lord who speaks. No, this is the covenant I will make with the House of Israel when those days arrive - it is the Lord who speaks. Deep within them I will plant my Law, writing it on their hearts. Then I will be their God and they shall be my people. There will be no further need for neighbour to try to teach neighbour, or brother to say to brother, 'Learn to know the Lord!' No, they will all know me, the least no less than the greatest - it is the Lord who speaks - since I will forgive their iniquity and never call their sin to mind.

During his life on earth, Christ offered up prayer and entreaty, aloud and in silent tears, to the one who had the power to save him out of death, and he submitted so humbly that his prayer was heard. Although he was Son, he learnt to obey through suffering; but having been made perfect, he became for all who obey him the source of eternal salvation.

Gospel Jn 12:20-33

If a grain of wheat falls on the ground and dies, it yields a rich harvest.

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. These approached Philip, who came from Bethsaida in Galilee, and put this request to him, 'Sir, we should like to see Jesus.' Philip went to tell Andrew, and Andrew and Philip together went to tell Jesus.

Jesus replied to them:

'Now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. I tell you most solemnly, unless a wheat grain falls on the ground and dies,

it remains only a single grain; but if it dies,

it yields a rich harvest.

Anyone who loves his life loses it; anyone who hates his life in this world will keep it for the eternal life.

If a man serves me, he must follow me, wherever I am, my servant will be there too.

If anyone serves me, my Father will honour him.

Now my soul is troubled.

What shall I say:

Father, save me from this hour?
But it was for this very reason that I have come to this hour.

Father, glorify your name!'

A voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.'

People standing by, who heard this, said it was a clap of thunder; others said, 'It was an angel speaking to him.' Jesus answered, 'It was not for my sake that this voice came, but for yours.

'Now sentence is being passed on this world:

now the prince of this world is to be overthrown.

And when I am lifted up from the earth, I shall draw all men to myself.'

By these words he indicated the kind of death he would die.

of moment eschatological fulfilment gathers together the sense of the past ('the days when Christ was in the flesh'), the future ('the days are coming'), and the present ('the hour has come'). We live in the time when the past and the future are made present; we live in the 'already-but-not-yet' time anticipation/fulfilment. This is moment of great ambiguity, of fear and trepidation but of electric excitement. It is a moment of decision. We hover at the edge of dawn, weighing whether or not to step forward into the new day or to return to the darkness of night.

This 'hour' brings a new covenant, a deep interior relationship with God that is not based on law but which overflows from a commitment of the heart. It brings an abundant harvest that springs from a simple grain of wheat. It brings a promise from God's own Son that those who serve him will be honoured by God, and those who obey him will enjoy eternal life.

Although the 'hour' brings all of these blessings, it only does so with a price. The new covenant could only be written on new hearts; the abundant harvest sprang from the dying grain of wheat: eternal salvation was won at the price of Christ's blood. As challenging as the message of these readings may be, the last note is one of hope. It can overcome the demons that control us, because it is the power of the almighty God.
