

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

CHALLENGES OF DISCIPLESHIP

As we listen to Jeremiah pouring his heart out to the Lord, it is not unusual for us to be somewhat embarrassed by his candour. It is as though we are eavesdropping on a very personal and private conversation between the suffering prophet and the God who has commissioned him. There is an enormous battle in the heart of Jeremiah as he wrestles with the message he must proclaim and the impact his preaching has on his own life.

Last week Peter was praised because he had come to understand that Jesus was the Christ, the Son of the living God. Now he must learn what the consequences mean for Jesus and then for those who follow in his footsteps as disciples. His well-meaning attempt to protect Jesus is misguided and like Jeremiah, he must struggle to accept the paradoxical and costly ways of God.

The Christians of Rome are encouraged by Paul to continue with the struggle to live a life of faith in a world that did not share their values and vision. In a world where there were many temples, gods and sacrificial banquets, Paul goes to the heart of the matter when he calls for an offering of one's life as a living sacrifice to God.

All the readings for today converge in laying the challenge before us of not losing heart, even though at times the difficulties might seem beyond our strength. Making our own the mind of Christ is not easy, but then again, it never was.



From the desk of the PP ...

Last Monday I had a routine colonoscopy (my Father had bowel cancer so regular tests are recommended as a preventative measure). All was Ok. no worries!

Afterwards, I emailed a report out to my brothers and sons, because of course they share the same risk profile as me. I got a whole range of comments back that went beyond "good to hear:" "Do I hear a hint of loneliness?" "You sound worried about your mortality?" None of which was what I meant, nor do they have any basis in reality for me.

What struck me through these comments, and why I am imposing my minor health matter on you, is how easily we can misunderstand each other, especially when we are not face to face, and doubly so it seems with electronic communications compared to letters (which hardly get used these days).

We can misunderstand each other face to face too, but when we are together, most often, we can correct any misunderstandings on the spot we can see the expressions on each other's faces and they give us clues about what lies behind the words spoken; we can see how a person is standing, we can hear a tone of voice, we have the context of a conversation ... lot's of extra cues to help understand each other.

All of these cues are missing from texts and emails and tweets and Instagram and Facebook.

I suspect part of the reason for confusion and mis-interpretation is that we can do the electronic communications so quickly: type, glance back, hit 'send' - no time for real reflection before sending. Perhaps if I had waited a day instead of sending my health-report to my brothers—perhaps that would have allowed the after effects of the anaesthetic to dissipate and I would have been able to phrase my words more accurately or clearly. Perhaps if I called around my brothers and spoke with them more often we would have been more in tune and my words would have been clear.

I remember getting a hand written phone message after a long morning at an intense management workshop. All the message said was "Hit by a truck, all ok, Tanya." WHAT!!! How could my wife be hit by a truck and all ok? ... I took the message at face value that all was Ok since I trust Tanya. I called: her CAR had been hit a glancing blow by a truck—she was shaken but not injured. Four words extra by the person taking the message would have helped wouldn't they "My car has been hit by a truck, all ok, Tanya" would have been so much better.

Let's all try and be more careful in our words and more charitable in our interpretations of what we hear and read and how we respond.

It occurs to me that if I am / we are rushing so much in our communications with each other—perhaps we're doing that with God too. Maybe this is a gentle call to me to put a little more time into talking with and listening to God's words to me. And so maybe a call to you also in your lives.

A quick prayer is great when that is all time permits—but maybe, just maybe, make an extra five minutes or ten minutes (or dare one even imagine thirty minutes) each day—to stop ... to listen ... to allow ourselves to be present with God so that we can better understand his words to us: because we listen we have the sense of God within us: the smell and sound and feel and touch and look of God surrounding us as we receive his guidance.
