

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

BEARING FRUIT THAT WILL LAST

In the ancient Near East, the struggles involved in agricultural life were numerous and well-known, lack of water, poor soil, and rocky ground. In such a setting, Isaiah's image of the people of Israel as a lovingly tended vine was an extremely powerful one. How could God's own people, so dearly loved, produce only sour grapes?

This image formed the backdrop for Jesus' own parable of the wicked tenants and Matthew's reflection on it. The religious authorities gathered and were marshalling their forces against Jesus. Now the moment had come for him to call them to account for their tenancy. During Jesus' ministry, this parable was unsettling and provocative, but for the early Christians, this parable provided them with a filter through which to see and understand Jesus' violent death at the hands of his own people. It also gave them a means by which they could understand that the vineyard had passed into the hands of others.

At first sight, it seems a far cry from the disappointment and violence that underlie the parables of Isaiah and Jesus to the tranquil encouragement of Paul to the Christians of Philippi. A deeper look reveals that today's parables rightly challenge us to bear fruit. Paul, on the other hand, is concerned as a pastor to give some practical guidance as to how to go about it. The fruit of peace will be ours if we turn to the Lord in prayer and seek what is truly of value.

In Our Thoughts though – he had a lot of useful insights into the nature of 'secularisation' in our society (many societies). 

The rest of the conference provided workshops and other keynote addresses that drew out these themes. Excellent workshops I went to were on Homilies and; Hospitality/Welcoming. The keynotes by Sarah Hart and Assoc. Prof. Maeve Louise Heaney VDMF were wonderful demonstrations of how to blend theology, listening, prayer, song, music, humour into a beautiful liturgy that isn't the Mass.

Two other highlights were the opening ceremony which was presented largely by Aboriginal people from the Brisbane area, drawing us into their understanding of the world and how it has been woven into Jesus Christ since time immemorial, and the Conference Mass in St Stephen's Cathedral where they put on a good show of how the Mass can raise the roof with all of us singing and responding with gusto to all prayers. Yes, they have a large choir and pay a music director for the archdiocese but the whole presentation was done so well, the very sound and form of it drew us in.

Expect to see some thoughts from the conference weave themselves into how we celebrate Mass in both St Greg's and St Kevin's in their own ways. It was worth the time and effort and money. Thank you for supporting us well enough that we could manage the cost.

Reflection from Jane:
