We are now turning to the gentiles.

Paul and Barnabas carried on from Perga till they reached Antioch in Pisidia. Here they went to synagogue on the sabbath and took their seats.

When the meeting broke up, many Jews and devout converts joined Paul and Barnabas, and in their talks with them Paul and Barnabas urged them to remain faithful to the grace God had given them.


The next sabbath almost the whole town assembled to hear the word of God. When they saw the crowds, the Jews, prompted by jealousy, used blasphemies and contradicted everything Paul said. Then Paul and Barnabas spoke out boldly, 'We had to proclaim the word of God to you first, but since you have rejected it, since you do not think yourselves worthy of eternal life, we must turn to the pagans. For this is what the Lord commanded us to do when he said:

I have made you a light for the nations, so that my salvation may reach the ends of the earth.'

It made the pagans very happy to hear this and they thanked the Lord for his message; all who were destined for eternal life became believers. Thus the word of the Lord spread through the whole countryside.

But the Jews worked upon some of the devout women of the upper classes and the leading men of the city and persuaded them to turn against Paul and Barnabas and expel them from their territory. So they shook the dust from their feet in defiance and went off to Iconium; but the disciples were filled with joy and the Holy Spirit.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

HOPE IN FACE OF TRIAL

The lives of each of us are touched by the realities of death and suffering in our world. As Christians, we are challenged to dig deep and explain the basis for our Christian hope. Why should Christians be hopeful? Why should we not give in to despair and disillusion? What is the basis for our belief that God's love is more powerful than the forces in our world which oppress and cause suffering?

Like ourselves, the first Christians had to deal with these problems. Opposition and persecution were realities for the earliest Christians and today's readings show something of the early Church's response to such difficulties. Paul and Barnabas faced the opposition of Jewish communities as they preached the good news of Jesus to Jews and Gentiles. They had come to see that the good news was meant for all nations and, by preaching the message of Jesus, the call to be a light for the nations would be fulfilled.

Some years later the Christian communities in Asia Minor were persecuted by Diocletian. It was a brutal and fearful time as Christians saw their brothers and sisters put to death. The book of the Apocalypse was written to encourage these Christians not to lose heart since Jesus had overcome death and he would shepherd them amidst their suffering.

The Johannine community had to deal with the distress and anguish that accompanied the expulsion of Christians from the synagogue. It is in the midst of such turmoil that they are reminded that with Jesus as their shepherd they need only listen to his voice to be assured of eternal life.

Words from Fr Charles:

Interesting Observations:

As I spent an hour with two young ladies preparing to receive Holy Communion for the first time and their parents and teachers, and as I spent time discussing paths forward for both St Gregory the Great and St Kevin's, and as I helped form some of our teachers to be effective as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, and as I have prepared my homilies over the past two weeks, a theme has emerged: There is a difference between hearing and listening and between looking and seeing.

This difference reminded me of going to a concert in Houston, Texas, USA, in perhaps 1993. The concert was focussed around a man who was said to be the worlds best up and coming pianist—the WORLD's up and coming best.

While I sat listening to his playing I thought it was truly stupendous. But Tanya, my wife, sitting with me, said during the first break "this pianist is technically brilliant but has no soul to his playing." My response was an engineers response: "but he's getting all the notes right! And Tanya said "you aren't listening to what you are hearing—this man has all the technical skill—absolutely—but listen again, where is the emotion, the passion, the depth to the way the notes are played. See, don't just look, at how he sits at the piano, so still and mechanical, there is no flow of the music through his body from his soul and into his fingers and toes and back. He doesn't love what he is doing." My memory suggests to me that Tanya was so distressed by the absence of depth to the playing that we left at the second intermission.

Tanya was right! I agreed at the time but more and more I realise she was right!!!!! I have learned a great deal more since then about the importance of bringing our whole selves to what we do: not just to be technically capable. Not just to be able to quote back what we hear or see. But engaged, fully, with the warmth of our hearts, the depths of our souls, the breadth of our minds and the strength of our bodies. When we listen and see in this way then we bring love into what we do and we find God's work in our lives. The disciples on the Road to Emmaus said "Did not our hearts burn within us" (when Jesus was showing them how all of history had been leading up to his life, death, burial and resurrection).

In this day and age that often seeks to deny God, deny faith, deny Jesus Christ, we need to continue to nurture our ability to hear AND listen, to look AND see.

Thank you Lord for that trail of "little things" which has woken me once again to listen and see.
