GOD'S KINGDOM IS NEAR. John the Baptist urged the people to prepare for the coming of the kingdom by repenting of their sins. Their baptism by John in the Jordan River was an important ritual act of sorrow. But they also had to express their sorrow by reforming their lives. The sacrament of reconciliation, and right living, are excellent means through which we can prepare for the feast of Christmas.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

Isa 11:1-10

A reading from the prophet Isaiah He judges the poor with justice.

A shoot springs from the stock of Jesse, a scion thrusts from his roots: on him the spirit of the Lord rests, a spirit of wisdom and insight, a spirit of counsel and power, a spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord. (The fear of the Lord is his breath.) He does not judge by appearances,

he gives no verdict on hearsay, but judges the wretched with integrity, and with equity gives a verdict for the poor of the land.

And may he who helps us when we refuse to give up, help you all to be tolerant with each other, following the example of Christ Jesus, so that united in mind and voice you may give glory to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

It can only be to God's glory, then, for you to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you. The reason Christ became the servant of circumcised Jews was not only so that God could faithfully carry out the promises made to the patriarchs, it was also to get the pagans to give glory to God for his mercy, as scripture says in one place: For this I shall praise you among the pagans and sing your name.

But if you are repentant, produce the appropriate fruit, and do not presume to tell vourselves, "We have Abraham for our father," because, I tell you, God can raise children for Abraham from these stones. Even now the axe is laid to the roots of the trees, so that any tree which fails to produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown on the fire. I baptise you in water for repentance, but the one who follows me is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to carry his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand; he will clear his threshing-floor and gather his wheat into the barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.'

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

CHANGE OF HEART

By the time Isaiah wrote, Israel had had some centuries of experience of kings, both good and bad. In that time there had been plenty of opportunities to learn what were the qualities that marked an ideal king – the presence of the spirit of the Lord, wisdom, insight, integrity, fairness, faithfulness, and concern for the poor. The longed for messiah would establish true quality of life, where even natural enemies would be able to live in peace.

One of the vexing problems Paul addressed among the Christians of Rome was how to overcome division and encourage tolerance, understanding and peace. His solution was to use the example of Jesus' tolerance and love as the basis and springboard for our way. In this way, even Jewish and Gentile Christians who were divided on the issue of food laws, would be able to live in peace with one another as they waited for the Lord's coming.

As John the Baptist began his ministry the time of the messiah, longed for by Isaiah, was finally dawning. The hope that had sustained generations was now being realised. John looked upon the evils of his day and saw that while the messiah was soon to return the people were not yet prepared to greet him. They mistakenly relied on belonging to the people of Israel by virtue of their birth. John saw that such children of God were as plentiful and as worthless as the stones that made farming so difficult. Then, as now, what was called for was a change of heart and an openness to the invitation to prepare for the Lord's coming among us.

From the prayers of Fr Charles:

Jesus must have loved verbs—in a way he IS a verb: an action Word (spoken over the emptiness at creation). Which means that it should be no surprise that when reading through the Gospels for Advent this year, each week presented a theme inviting or calling us to action:

Week 1. Watchfulness! Stay Awake!
Week 2. Prepare the way of the Lord.
Week 3. What did YOU go out to see?
You must name him Jesus.

There is a progression through the weeks isn't there—leading us, calling us, guiding us towards ... God's love. Christmas is one of those key moments in our year where we are called to renew our commitment to the journey of faith.

Each week we are asked to do a open our selves in a different way. During this past, first, week—a call for us to be willing to listen and see God's work for us. Next to be be willing to help bring others to awareness of Jesus Christ. Then to be willing to look deeper, to delve further into what faith means to 'me'. Finally to be willing to look for Jesus and <u>name</u> his presence: to name HIM. Then we can be just a bit more ready to recognise what it means to celebrate Christmas.

Once we start thinking in this way we become, slowly, more capable of living our faith deliberately, intentionally, consciously. The habits of faith are essential if they free us to grow in love of God. The habits of faith are a burden if they constrain us into an unbendable routine.

I invite you to journey with me to Christmas with an open heart, mind, soul.

Warning!!! Boring item!!! - Well, NO!!: It is not boring: it is vitally interesting!

Child Safety!!!

We still need some of our volunteers to front up and get themselves up to date with a Working with Children Check (.WWCC) and Code of Conduct.

Yeeesssss.... We are doing Ok—about 75% there (congratulations).

But—would you accept 75% compliance/accuracy/completeness from your bank or insurance company or supermarket or airline or landlord ...???

We need to get to 100% compliance, please.

If you do ANYTHING for the church on a regular basis you need a WWCC and to sign our Code of Conduct.

During interviews recently we've been asking people what they think it means to be "ChildSafe" and pretty much universally people have said "it means ensuring there is no harm done to our children" and within that there was a thread of being intentional—thinking ahead about the risks and planning for them.

Last weekend I was at a restaurant with my family and my granddaughter went for a wander—no problem—I followed we had a lovely few moments chasing around the she hared off back to mum and dad. I dropped behind, didn't call to slow her, and next I know she tripped down a step and planted her face in the floor, because she was so keen to get to mum. No harm done in that case but hmmm! What about other risks? How could I help avoid such things in future? That trivial incident captures something of the need we have to improve all the time to sensibly prevent possibilities of harm of all sorts. Your getting a WWCC does nothing in itself but within you it starts a process or continues a process of bringing care for children to conscious awareness (not worry). Through that awareness, over time, we learn to create a culture of safety with a culture of gentle review so that we can always improve.
