BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

SHARING JESUS' MINISTRY

Surprising as it may seem, even though the letters of Paul were written some years before the Gospels, they rarely mention directly sayings of the Lord. One of the exceptions is when Paul sets out to remind his wayward converts at Corinth about the true meaning of the Eucharist. They had become all too complacent about their celebration of the Eucharist and, as far as Paul was concerned, rather than proclaiming the Lord's death till his return they were responsible for his death! To bring them back on the right track Paul reminds them of the tradition that he had received (cf. 1 Corinthians 15:3-5).

Matthew, Mark, Luke and Paul all hand on traditions about the Last Supper but Luke (22:19-20) and Paul (1 Corinthians 11:23-25) have a couple of special emphases that are worth noting. Firstly, they both focus on the Eucharist as a way of actively remembering the saving death of Jesus. Secondly, they both make it clear that in Jesus' blood a new stage in salvation history has arrived; a new covenant now binds us to God.

In the early church, the feeding of the five thousand was related in such a way that it reflected the Last Supper. Jesus taking the bread, breaking it, and giving it to the disciples to distribute, all mirrored elements of the Last Supper. What was new was that now the disciples were called to share in Jesus' ministry of welcome and hospitality; a ministry we are still called to share.

This has proved to be an interesting week. Three funeral in the one week and I was only able to preside for one of the three because I have been attending the Cleray Conference.

I missed most of the first day because I came back for the funeral of Lee Sammassimo, god rest his soul. The two take-away ideas people have mentioned from day one are:

Watch the 16.5 minute video on You Tube called "Validation" telling a story of how important it is to let each other know the good things about us - affirming our goodness. Totally over the top positive but a lovely reminder of needing to affirm each other. I recommend watching, a little light way of reminding ourselves of the importance of love in our lives.



Day two brought a presentation from the Archbishop of Lodz, in Poland. He a gave a simple and clear message: go out among the people who aren't present and be the presence of Jesus Christ for them – accompanying them even when we don't agree with them. Thursday we will be sharing some examples of how two parishes are looking to become more capable at actively seeking to spread the Good News caring for the present community and at the same time seeking to be disciples who go and make disciples.

These clergy conferences are an important few days each year (except the last two) in which we can gather to share what is happening around the parishes of the archdiocese and support each other in ministry.
