laborious to know what lies within our reach; who, then, can discover what is in the heavens?



A reading from the letter of St Paul to Philemon

Receive him, not as a slave anymore, but as a very dear brother.

This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father I became while wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you, and with him - I could say a part of my own self. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a bloodbrother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me.

# **BREAKING OPEN THE WORD**

## GETTING OF WISDOM

The search for wisdom has never been an easy one and each of us grapples with the challenge of making sense of the complex tapestry of life. As the first reading so pointedly observes, 'It is hard enough to work out what is on earth ... who, then, can discover what is in the heavens?' In the centuries that preceded Jesus' birth the people of Israel were fascinated, frightened and challenged by their encounter with the culture and philosophy of the Greek-speaking world. The book of Wisdom is one of the fruits of that encounter and was itself written in Greek. While the Greeks looked to Plato and Aristotle, the author of the book of Wisdom had come to see that true wisdom is a gift from God and is to be found in the traditions of Israel most particularly in the Law of Moses.

Jesus knew all too well that true wisdom has its price. As he journeys towards his death, those who would be disciples are forcefully reminded to carefully consider the cost of discipleship.

Paul was one apostle of the Lord who knew the cost of discipleship. For the sake of the gospel he had gone through many trials (cf. 2 Corinthians 11:22-29) and had suffered and learnt much. Writing from prison he now has to call on all his stores of wisdom to convince Philemon to take back his runaway slave Onesimus. In a world where slavery was an accepted reality, Philemon is challenged to see his former slave as a brother in Christ.

You will get a call from Vera in the near future if you aren't up to date. She and Nadia have already emailed volunteers we know of. The phone call will be our last effort before we are mandated to remove those who non-compliant from the roster.

I don't want to lose volunteers, you are vital to the life of our faith community. Please, if you do anything with the parish of a volunteer nature: get a Working with children Check, sign a code of conduct.

Second: thank you to those half dozen church people who came for the working bee last Saturday morning. Your efforts have given our grounds a real lift.

# And finally: Happy Father's Day!!

I sat with some Dads and Children at the St Greg's School Father's Day Breakfast on Thursday and asked one Dad if eating breakfast with his daughter was a first. "No! I try to always have breakfast with her." I realized that I can't remember a time as my children grew up that I shared breakfast with them other than weekends and holidays. Getting to the office required catching the bus and to manage the traffic I left early. The Dad I was talking to said pre-Covid that would have been him too but now—he has discovered the importance of starting the day with family and is very pleased that working conditions now allow him the choice to breakfast with family.

It is easy to allow the busyness of our lives to prevent us from being together. I know it is hard.

I had to leave the Father's Day breakfast at St Greg's to go to a meeting at St Kevin's so I couldn't stay to see the magician. As I reflect on my words that I have just written: did I HAVE to leave? could I have cancelled that meeting and stayed to be with community? Hmmm ... how can we focus on what is truly important.

We remain at about 60% of pre-Covid Mass attendance —and that proportion is very common across the parishes around Melbourne. What happened to the other 40%?

Some remain sensibly wary of large groups due to health concerns. But what about the others? Who do you know that hasn't returned? Are you able to discern what would help them return? Can you invited them to come with you?

When we talk about allowing time for what is truly important then for me at least that must include time to gather as a people of faith. Faith needs nourishment. How can we make our gatherings nourishing of faith?

There are requests for a Women's Group to restart; for a group or groups to be formed to reflect on the weekend readings and draw them into life; for a regular healing Mass; ... what would help nurture your faith as a truly important basis in your life?
