
OUR SUNDAY CELEBRATION

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

ARE YOU THE ONE?

One can only begin to imagine the excitement, questioning and discussion that must have accompanied the beginning of Jesus' ministry. Reports were flying thick and fast about the carpenter-turned-preacher from Nazareth, whose preaching was accompanied by miraculous healings, and disconcerting sayings. Was it true that Isaiah's prophecy about the eyes of the blind being opened, and the deaf once again being able to hear was being fulfilled?

John the Baptist had spoken with courage about the messiah who was coming and this led to his imprisonment. He had preached that the coming messiah would be a figure of purification and judgement upon Israel. Could it be that Jesus was the promised one? John could not reconcile Jesus' message and ministry with the message for which he had risked his life. Jesus' response to John's question is simple – you must make your judgement based on what you see. If Isaiah's prophecy is being fulfilled, then there is no need to look any further.

A challenge for James' community was that they recognised Jesus was indeed the saviour, but how were they to manage until his return at the end of time? Their impatience for the Lord's return was leading them into the trap of being fractious with each other. James provides both them and us with the timely reminder that patience with the Lord and each other is a better way to prepare to greet the Lord on his return.

From the PP's Desk:

This past Tuesday I went into Melbourne to meet with Archbishop Peter—at my request. I wanted to, and did, give him a 'situation report' for us, St Greg's and St Kevin's. I wanted him to know how wonderful you are and how willing you are to learn to grow in faith and to spread the faith. I also wanted him to know that we don't have all the answers but we are seeking them. That is what the two forums we've held are for: to look at our ministries and seek to enrich them and perhaps grow them to focus through the lens of Jesus' Mission to go out to all with the Good News. Archbishop Peter was delighted to hear what I told him. As we drew to a close he said 'Charles, there is one thing I didn't hear ..." (oh dear I thought ... what ...) "I didn't hear about complaints / arguments about having this renewed focus" ... (whew, that's an easy one) ... "Well", I said, "that is because there aren't any. We may not know exactly how to move ahead but we want to and so people are willing to work forwards an allow space for the Holy Spirit to guide us as we work."

So, I must say to you THANK YOU. It is you who have enabled me to have that conversation with the Archbishop with such a positive message.

And to a different thought: I spent 30 minutes with the Grade 4 children during the week, answering or trying to answer their questions. All sorts of Advent questions: why purple? what do the candles in the wreath mean? And then all sorts of other questions. Why is the Sabbath important? What would happen to the Sabbath if God created the world in 3 days? Can animals be stewards of creation? "40" seems special why? Why is the Pope called 'pope'? Did I have to give away everything to be a priest (no) and do I get lonely (yes sometimes, like everyone)? There were a lot more questions and we couldn't get to them all.

Some of those questions are matters of just explaining something (the colour in advent for example, or that pope means 'father' in Greek (a fact I had forgotten at the time). Some are really deep like that one about animals being stewards and about the Sabbath or creation in 3 days.

I love spending time with the children answering their questions. It inspires me to look at the world through fresh eyes and challenges me to understand what I've always known in a new way. I know the teachers are there and they control things and prepare the children but I have never had an inappropriate question (the nearest, back in 2016, was about the colour of my underwear the teacher was shocked but I just had a good laugh).

Jesus does this to us all the time in the Gospels: he challenges us to open our eyes, to change our perspective. The parables do this: the kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed. This weekend our Gospel challenge is different:

"What did YOU go out into the wilderness to see?"

You need to answer that question again this year. Not because you don't' know the answer but because each time you ask it your understanding deepens about God's dep and abiding love for each of us.

By chance the opportunity exists for a particular way you might help answer that question for yourself: you could take a space on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land with Fr Bill Edebohls of Mary Mother of the Church Catholic Parish Ivanhoe. The brochure is in the narthex if you're interested.
