A reading from the Acts of the Apostles It was impossible for him to be held by the power of Hades.


On the day of Pentecost Peter stood up with the Eleven and addressed the crowd in a loud voice: 'Men of Israel, listen to what I am going to say: Jesus the Nazarene was a man commended to you by God by the miracles and portents and signs that God worked through him when he was among you, as you all know. This man, who was put into your power by the deliberate intention and foreknowledge of God, you took and had crucified by men outside the Law. You killed him, but God raised him to life, freeing him from the pangs of Hades; for it was impossible for him to be held in its power since, as David says of him:

I saw the Lord before me always, / for with him at my right hand nothing can shake me. / So my heart was glad / and my tongue cried out with joy: / my body, too, will rest in the hope / that you will not abandon my soul to Hades / nor allow your holy one to experience corruption. / You have made known the way of life to me, / you will fill me with gladness through your presence.

'Brothers, no one can deny that the patriarch David himself is dead and buried: his tomb is still with us. But since he was a prophet, and knew that God had sworn him an oath to make one of his descendants succeed him on the throne, what he foresaw and spoke about was the resurrection of the Christ: he is the one who was not abandoned to Hades, and whose body did not experience corruption. God raised this man Jesus to life, and all of us are witnesses to that. Now raised to the heights by God's right hand, he has received from the Father the Holy Spirit, who was promised, and what you see and hear is the outpouring of that Spirit.'

Remember, the ransom that was paid to free you from the useless way of life your ancestors handed down was not paid in anything corruptible, neither in silver nor gold, but in the precious blood of a lamb without spot or stain, namely Christ; who, though known since before the world was made, has been revealed only in our time, the end of the ages, for your sake. Through him you now have faith in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory for that very reason – so that you would have faith and hope in God.

They recognised him at the breaking of the bread. Two of the disciples of Jesus were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking together about all that had happened. Now as they talked this over, Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; but something prevented them from recognising him. He said to them, 'What matters are you discussing as you walk along?' They stopped short, their faces downcast.

Then one of them, called Cleopas, answered him, 'You must be the only person staying in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have been happening there these last few days.' 'What things?' he asked. 'All about Jesus of Nazareth' they answered 'who proved he was a great prophet by the things he said and did in the sight of God and of the whole people; and how our chief priests and our leaders handed him over to be sentenced to death, and had him crucified. Our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free. And this is not all: two whole days have gone by since it all happened; and some women from our group have astounded us: they went to the tomb in the early morning, and when they did not find the body, they came back to tell us they had seen a vision of angels who declared he was alive. Some of our friends went to the tomb and found everything exactly as the women had reported, but of him they saw nothing.'

Then he said to them, 'You foolish men! So slow to believe the full message of the prophets! Was it not ordained that the Christ should suffer and so enter into his glory?' Then, starting with Moses and going through all the prophets, he explained to them the passages throughout the scriptures that were about himself.

When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on; but they pressed him to stay with them. 'It is nearly evening' they said 'and the day is almost over.' So he went in to stay with them. Now while he was with them at the table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognised him; but he had vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, 'Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?'

They set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven assembled together with their companions, who said to them, 'Yes, it is true. The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon.' Then they told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised him at the breaking of bread.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

OF GOD'S PLAN

In order to piece a jigsaw together, a great deal of patience is required, as well as the skill of being able to work out the relationship of one piece to the pieces around it. Slowly, large patterns begin to take shape, and so it was with the early Church. In the light of the experience of the Risen Lord, and the catalyst provided by the gift of the Spirit, the first generation of Christians was able to place the life, death and resurrection of Jesus into their proper context. The gift of the Spirit enabled Peter to see that all that had taken place in the life of Jesus was part of a larger plan, and took place with God's foreknowledge. Even Jesus' death was but a preliminary step towards his exaltation and ability to pour out the gift of the Spirit on those who believe.

In a similar vein, Peter saw that promises made before the world began were now fulfilled in Jesus. While the end of days was seen to have already begun, the final pieces of the jigsaw had yet to be put in place. In the meantime, the community was called to remember with gratitude the price Jesus had paid for our freedom, and to live appropriately till the Lord's return. For the disciples on the road to Emmaus, it was not an easy matter to see how the pieces of the puzzle of Jesus' life fitted together. As they journeyed, they were helped by the Risen Lord to finally understand the message contained in the Scriptures and to recognise him with them in the breaking of the bread.

From the desk of ... the PP.

Thirty years ago my family and I were visiting the Minnamurra Falls near Kiama, New South Wales. There was a sign by the path and it said: "A small stone taken is nothing. A pretty flower taken is nothing. But there are two million visitors to these falls each year. If each person takes a stone - there would be nowhere to put the paths along this river. If each person took a flower – the three varieties unique to these falls would become extinct." Small things: consequences!

Recently at St Greg's, I sat down to pray while awaiting people to come to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation with me. As I adjusted my seating my fingers closed over a piece of ... chewing gum. Yuck! I got curious, and spent ten minutes running my hand under all the leading edges of the pews in the church and counted 308 pieces of chewing gum, spread pretty uniformly across the church. The pews were last cleaned over a decade ago and there are four Masses per weekend (let's assume weekday Masses don't leave chewing gum). So, 10 years and 52 weeks and 4 masses and 150 people per Mass, that is only one piece of chewing gum per one thousand people who come through the church: not much. Small things. Yet the consequences will take significant effort to rectify when next we do the pews.

Those are rather negative views. But let's take a positive view. If each visitor donated \$1 to the management trust for Minnamurra Falls, that national park could do wonders to improve the environment and the sustainability of the falls park lands. Small things: consequences. Allowing that there are health / infirmity matters that limit many people, iIf each person who attends Mass committed to assist with one ministry for hour a month (in addition to gathering in praise and joy around Word and Eucharist) that would make 1800 hours at St Greg's, 1000 hours at St Kevin's. Imagine what that commitment could lead to. Small things: consequences.

Update on Progress Report

You will recall Fr Charles wrote a progress report in March on parish planning and future thinking.

Following the report, Fr Charles and the four parishioners supporting him (Alfred Ablaza, Margaret O'Donnell, Tiziana D'Costa and Carmel Purdey) held small group consultations with parishioners from St Gregory's and St Kevin's. The consultations are designed to give parishioners the opportunity to provide feedback and ask questions following the Progress Report. The staff from both parish offices have also been consulted.

The consultations have given the parishioners from both parishes a chance to get to know one another and to exchange views. Each time, the dialogue was open, constructive and frank.

These are the themes that have emerged from the consultations:

- Widespread support for consultation, dialogue and cooperation between the parishes.
- Keep communication open and up to date on parish planning.
- Widespread acceptance that Fr Charles is the parish priest of two parishes and two communities. We need to work together to alleviate the obvious pressures of one parish priest looking after two parishes. Sharing resources where appropriate, for example, administration could be a way forward to address this.
- Acknowledgement that each parish has its own history, traditions and cul-
- Support for sharing of resources (eg safeguarding committee) and learning from each other.

Stay tuned for more updates after Fr Charles' return from leave.


