 (A new Code of Conduct Declaration will be available in January 2022)



Plenary Council - a different opinion by John Warhurst

Here are some observations from John Warhurst, a participant in the first Assembly which encourage such hope. It is important to know that John is Chair of Concerned Catholics Canberra-Goulburn and a long-time critic of the PC process shortcomings before the Assembly, as well as a critical assessor of the Assembly proceedings in his daily blogs from the Assembly frontline.

In his last blog on the last day of proceedings (Saturday 9 October) John writes:

"This has been a massive exercise of which the church should be proud...The broader impact on the sociology and dynamics of the church in Australia is incalculable. Networks and recognition of common interests have developed on all sides. We remain 'a house divided' in the words of one member, but some silos have been broken down".

John reports movement at the station but sees that much needs to be done between now and the second PC Assembly to maintain momentum and ensure that the proposals based on discussions in the first Assembly are indeed substantial and reflective of our calls for deep change. In weeks to come I will suggest some things we might do to help achieve this.

The Challenge of Church Ventilation in Covid19 Times

Dear SFX & OLHC Parishioners,

After having two meetings with Michael recently, we agreed it would be a good idea to prepare some information on ventilation to share with you all.

Here it is...

Like many of you, I am looking forward to gathering, as community, in one of our churches... hopefully soon. This possibility requires us all to understand how this can be achieved whilst creating a maximum COVID19-safe environment.

There are many requirements already established, such as masks, social distancing, QR codes, double vaccination certificates etc. The Victorian Government creates these rules on the recommendations of the Chief Health Officer.

This brings us to a point where we can ask ourselves what action we, as parishioners, can take to ensure that we are safe as we return to Liturgical Celebrations in both churches.

It has been known, for over 12 months, that aerosol transmission of Covid19 is real. Fortunately, science has been focussed on how wise ventilation choices contribute to keeping us safe.

Now, please take a look at the Info Chart (right):

We either use mechanical ventilation or natural ventilation.

By choosing natural ventilation (right hand side of diagram) there is the added advantage of no costs incurred!

So... when the Churches are in use, they can be naturally ventilated by:

- Opening every window and door regardless of the weather, ie cold and hot days. This would require individuals to dress accordingly for their own comfort.
- Not using any of the existing mechanical ventilation devices we already have installed, ie heaters, coolers and ceiling fans, as they only recirculate the air and any Covid19 aerosols the air may contain.

Finally, we must apply these practices enabling us to confidently move forward to a new normal way of attending Church Liturgical Celebrations.

Safer Indoor Air for Workplaces

LOW RELATIVE RISK

· Below 800ppm

MODERATE RELATIVE RISK

- 800-1500 ppm
- work to improve indoor air quality to low relative risk range

HIGH RELATIVE RISK

- Above 1500 ppm
- moderate risk reading not improving
- Leave room until air quality improved.
- Increase ventilation bringing outdoor air indoors.
- Use HEPA filters with ventilation to assist if occurs repeatedly.
- Reduce occupancy or cease activity causing high risk air quality.

Portable HEPA filters

- Use filtration to clean the air, do not add anything to the air.
- Use the right size and avoid low flow settings.
- CADR = clean air delivery rate
- Aim for an equivalent of minimum
 6 air changes per hour (ACHe)
- ACHe X Room volume = CADR needed
- Use of more filters may allow for less noise.
- AHEPA filters will not lower the CO2 reading on the monitor.

Fans must be placed to direct indoor air outside & encourage cross ventilation. Take care not to recirculate, including avoiding the use of split system air-conditioning

It's a reminder for me to ask everyone


to check whether they have books at home that need to be returned.



Homily

Many of us will be familiar with the musical Les Miserables. It is certainly one of my favourite musicals. It tells the story of Valjean who had stolen a loaf of bread and had spent 19 years in gaol for his crime. He was a bitter man when released, but turned his life around and became a man of mercy, bringing his compassion and love to many people in life, especially to his adopted daughter Cosette.

I could share his story in some detail but that is not really my purpose. Rather, let me quote some beautiful lines of the song he sings in his dying moments:

'Take my love, for love is everlasting. And remember the truth that once was spoken: to love another person is to see the face of God.'

What beautiful words, especially those words, 'to love another person is to see the face of God.'

If we hold these words and take a look at today's Gospel we listen to the response of Jesus to the question, 'which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus says:

'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this, you must love your neighbour as yourself.'

Jesus' words were not new to the Jewish faith. In today's first reading from Deuteronomy, long before the time of Jesus, we hear the words, "Listen Israel. The Lord our God is the one Lord. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength. Let these words I urge you today, be written on your hearts."

To love. Let me share another story. The story is told of a seeker of truth approaching Rabbi Hillel, and saying: "If you can teach me your whole religion standing on one leg, I will become your disciple." And Rabbi Hillel answered: "You shall love your God with your whole mind and your whole heart and your whole soul. Everything else is commentary."

How do we love God in this way? Would it be fair to say that the commandment to love God and to love you neighbour as yourself are really so intertwined as to become one?

We think back to Valjean and his words 'to love another person is to see the face of God.' How profound.

We can think of people who show us the meaning of love. I think of some young parents in our Parish caring for their little boy who has severe epilepsy. He has frequent and at times long seizures and as his Mum said to me "I am terrified when this happens". And there she is, holding him in her arms attentive to his every need. That's love for her child and that's love of God in her whether she knows it or not. In fact, she may well be angry with God and yet in a very profound way she is the face of God to her child and God's face is also the face of her child.

Or what about people who care for someone who struggles with memory loss? It can even be that this person no longer remembers the names of family members and yet they are cared for in a beautiful way by their spouse and/or their children. Even in the face of a person with Alzheimer's, the face of God beckons in love. And to love and care for this person is indeed loving God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength.

So we look to our own lives and see where love lives within us. And when we love other people we too see the face of God, and we are in a very real way, the face of God, for God is love. *Terry*
