

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Important Child Safeguarding Information

As a faith community, we continue to stand united in embracing compliance with our policies and pursuing best practice in safeguarding children and all vulnerable people, in this way we are respecting the inherent value of everyone.

Child abuse can be defined as all forms of abuse involving a child including: physical abuse, emotional abuse, sexual abuse, neglect, exploitation and exposure to family violence.

Sometimes it can be difficult to know if your instincts about child abuse and neglect are right. There are often behavioural or physical signs of stress when a child has been, or is experiencing abuse. It is important to note that children may suffer from one or more types of abuse.

These forms of abuse and their associated warning signs are set out below.

Some signs of abuse can include:

- Distrust or wariness of adults;
- Extreme behaviour: aggressive, submissive, anxious, distressed;
- Low self-esteem, being withdrawn or having difficulty relating to adults or other children;
- · Being overly obedient and trying hard to please;
- Difficulty concentrating;
- Excessive rocking, humming, sucking, or biting;
- Bedwetting, frequent nightmares or sleeping difficulties (seeming tired and falling asleep at unusual times);
- Seeming to be accident prone or having unexplained bruises or injuries at different stages of healing;
- Explanations for injuries that are unbelievable, vague or don't align with the type of injury;
- Alcohol or drug abuse;
- Suicidal tendencies;
- Not wanting to go home (or somewhere else);
- Creating stories or artwork about abuse;
- Inappropriate sexual knowledge or behaviour for the age and development of the child;
- Wearing clothes unsuitable for weather conditions to hide injuries;
- An adult discloses historical abuse that occurred when they were a child.

Reporting Abuse

Reporting child abuse requires a person to form a 'reasonable' belief that a child or young person has experienced abuse, is experiencing abuse or is at risk of harm.

Definitive proof or evidence that abuse has occurred, is occurring, or that a child or young person is at risk is not required and it is not appropriate for you to undertake an investigation.

The disclosure of abuse can be a very difficult and emotionally challenging process for a child, young person or adult and needs to be handled sensitively and respectfully.

All information relating to a concern, allegation or complaint is to be treated with sensitivity and the upmost confidentiality.

Advent Meditation / Rejoice for the Lord is near

In her reflection on the first reading for the Third Sunday of Advent, **Leonie Caldecott** welcomes the warming flame of Rose Sunday

Gaudete Sunday brings a strange counterpoint between joy and imprecation. In the first reading we find ourselves in a triumphalist mosh pit of lockdown "Shout for joy, escapees. daughter of Zion, Israel, shout aloud!" (Zephaniah 3:14). A victorious warrior is coming to steady our traumatised limbs. Gaudete in Domino semper!

Meanwhile, out there by the murmuring Jordan, the Baptist is in full personal trainer mode, reminding us of the urgent need to act soberly and justly. Not to have our eyes on the main chance, but to share nicely; to take no more than our due. Not to treat necks like footrests. It's not exactly rocket science.

St Paul, a reformed legalist, reminds us that we are after all destined for happiness. But like St John's anxious interlocutors, we are rarely ILLUSTRATION: ROSE-MARIE CALDECOTT



clear what this might mean. "What must we do?" We long for quick solutions: but panic buying won't give us existential peace. John is trying to clear a path, not to simple answers, but to the One who will give us the underlying workings of the core problem: what are we here for? What does it mean to be human? Fatally flawed, apparently, but not hopelessly so. We have a choice. "Let your tolerance be evident to everyone: the Lord is very

near" (Philippians 4:5).

And of course, the forerunner now turns the spotlight away from himself and towards the headline act: the Lord who is near, Emmanuel. God with us. You can't throw a party without thinking about the point of the festivities; just as you can't bring in a harvest without agricultural know-how. Cue the "winnowing fan" (Luke 3:17).

For those who don't already know (and yes, it's fine to geek out on lists of ancient wheat varieties), this is a perfect piece of proportionate technology: a cross between a shallow basket and a large shovel. The wheat kernels need to be shaken free from the coating that surrounded them on the stalk: the manual agitation of the winnowing fan causes this organic material to fly off into the wind, leaving only the heavy grain behind. When we hear the words "work of human hands" at the beginning of the Eucharistic rite, it is this kind of painstaking effort that is being referred to: extracting the sumptuous fruit of the earth, ready to be ground for the substance we call bread.

The chaff is then burned, much as we burn leaves in the autumn. St John, however, refers to a "fire that will never go out" (Luke 3:17). This is another of those "integrity" moments. The hands that are coming to shake things up are hands that know what they are doing. The Spirit that is going to blow away the parts of ourselves we don't really need is a spirit of love.

The unquenchable fire portrayed in George MacDonald's *The Princess and Curdie*: a regenerative fire of roses, its flames the purificatory blaze of hope, warming our wintry hands on Rose Sunday.

Gospel - Luke 3:10-18

When all the people asked John, 'What must we do?' he answered, 'If anyone has two tunics he must share with the man who has none, and the one with something to eat must do the same.' There were tax collectors too who came for baptism, and these said to him, 'Master, what must we do?' He said to them, 'Exact no more than your rate.' Some soldiers asked him in their turn, 'What about us? What must we do?' He said to them, 'No intimidation! No extortion! Be content with your pay!'

A feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, 'I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to undo the strap of his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.' As well as this, there were many other things he said to exhort the people and to announce the Good News to them.

Reflection

Having introduced us to John the Baptist last Sunday, Luke now gives us a fuller picture of his prophetic ministry. John's proclamation of a "baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins" draws a crowd of listeners who want to know what they must do.

The question is posed in turn by the general populace, tax collectors and soldiers. Notably absent from this selection are the religious authorities. Perhaps they have been stung by John's use of the term "brood of vipers" in the verses preceding the reading. Luke is already signalling who will welcome the good news and who will not.

John's replies are eminently fair. The people are called to care for the needy. Tax collectors and soldiers are told not to abuse their power. Essentially John is doing no more than bidding them observe the precepts of the Law, in contrast with the rigorous demands Jesus makes in the Sermon on the Mount.

But John goes on to herald the advent of the long-awaited Messiah who will usher in a new era of Spirit and fire. A new era it may be, but John still uses the traditional imagery of divine judgement to describe it. It will take time for Luke to spell out what the Baptist's "good news" really means. **Break Open the Word 2021**
